**CALL TO ORDER**

The Chairperson, Councillor Joan Jones, called the meeting to order at 6:03 pm.

**ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA**

**Chairperson Verbal Report: Leland to Village Core Pathway**

Continue Huddlestone to Walk of Honour; Continue to Tweedhope with raised island and flashing beacon with an estimated cost of \$40K; June 11, 2025, Council meeting motions were discussed

**UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

**Continue to focus on the Council motion dated March 20, 2024, as noted below:**

THAT Council directs the Parks and Trails Committee to review the 2010 Lantzville Trails & Journeyways Strategy and the 2008 Parks and Trails Plan and provide recommended edits to Council.

**NEW BUSINESS**

**Hiking Trail Standard**

Compared to Schooner Cove, City of Nanaimo and District of Squamish trail standards; table reviewed in working document; discussion about various trail standards and how trails get started took place; types of users was discussed; Lantzville’s trails are not at the level where a trail needs to be limited to certain uses; added stream crossings; remove example of under the power lines; vegetation definition reviewed; horizontal curves; slope and drainage reviewed; level of maintenance ok; maintenance was reviewed; cliffs in close proximity to the trail and at view points; level of difficulty

MOVED AND SECONDED, THAT the Parks and Trails Select Committee recommend that Council direct staff to add a new pathway called “hiking trail” and its design guidelines to Bylaw 175 [reference Table 2 as per the report provided by the Parks and Trails Select Committee below]

**Table 2: Hiking Trail: Design guidelines**

<b>Hiking Trail: Design guidelines</b>	
Level of Use	Low-high. May be seasonal use.
Types of Use	Hiking, trail running, dogs, may be suitable for mountain bikes
Surface and material	Natural terrain and native soil that may have roots, rocks, sand and steep sections.
Width	Varying: singletrack, doubletrack and wider.
Vegetation clearance	Natural. Usually not cut. Clearance varies.
Horizontal curves	Yes especially when the trail has been constructed to manage steep sections with switchbacks or to meander around large trees.

<b>Slope and drainage</b>	Terrain may be steep. Materials for erosion and drainage control are usually sourced near the trail (ex: mineral soil in roots of fallen trees, rocks for firming wet surfaces and managing flow of rain water).
<b>Level of Maintenance</b>	None to Low
<b>Barriers</b>	Riparian areas. May have cliffs in close proximity to the trail and at viewpoints.
<b>Comments</b>	Level of difficulty: easy to difficult. Be prepared. Expect wildlife (ex: bears, cougars). Cell service questionable.

**Report:**

Hiking trails are frequented by users looking to get out in nature.

Trails may be frequently used or rarely used.

Most of the hiking trails in the Lantzville area are not sanctioned or maintained by the District of Lantzville. Users should expect to find natural terrain that can vary depending on weather conditions. Users may come across blowdowns blocking the trail and wet areas caused by heavy rains.

Users should come prepared and respect the wildlife and nature.

**Chairperson Update on June 4, 2025, Working Group Walk: Fernmar, Aulds, Golf Course and Woodlot**

Councillor Jones updated the group about the working group activities.

**June 12 Working Group Update**

Susan, Valerie, Claire and Councillor Jones worked on revisions to Map A.

**June 17 Working Group Update**

Valerie, Susan and Councillor Jones continued edits to Map A

Revisions to Map A were explained by Councillor Jones [updated format of Map A in the 2010 Lantzville Trails & Journeyways Strategy to add in new subdivisions, etc., for the Committee to work on]; Claire asked about a location where there is a road but there is no road in that location; Valmar Road area was questioned; Councillor Jones offered to bring any questions about the map to staff; FOG zone location needed

Councillor Jones asked to add Late Items to address motions to go to Council. The Committee agreed to add these items.

MOVED AND SECONDED, THAT the Parks and Trails Select Committee recommend that Council direct staff to add signage to the E & N multi use path, located from Clark Drive to Ware Road, and to the multi use path located on the north side of Lantzville Road, from Tweedhope Road to Dickinson Road, to indicate that multi use trails may be used by pedestrians and cyclists

Report:

Awareness of usage is needed for safety reasons. (Users have complained to cyclists incorrectly claiming they are not permitted to cycle on these routes.)

**CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY**

Discussion occurred indicating that “Share the Road” signage will be placed in the Village Core where the road is very narrow; 30km is the typical speed for a shared road

MOVED AND SECONDED, THAT the Parks and Trails Select Committee recommend that Council direct staff to add signage to the Tweedhope Crosswalk to indicate that it is used by pedestrians and cyclists

Report:

Drivers, pedestrians and cyclists need to be aware that this crosswalk may be used by pedestrians and cyclists who dismount to walk the crosswalk. The signs will improve safety.

Cyclists riding on Lantzville road and approaching from the west of the Village Core may use the crosswalk to access the multi-use path located between Tweedhope Rd and Dickinson Rd on the north side of Lantzville Road. Note: more experienced road cyclists may cycle on Lantzville Rd between Tweedhope Rd and Caillet Rd as this section is narrowed and designated as a “Share the Road” route.

MOVED AND SECONDED, THAT the Parks and Trails Select Committee recommend that Council direct staff to add a new pathway called “on road cycling route” and its design guidelines to Bylaw 175 [reference Table 3 as per the report provided by the Parks and Trails Select Committee below]

**Table 3: On-road Cycling Routes**

<b>On-road Cycling Routes: Design guidelines</b>	
Level of Use	low-high
Types of Use	Road bikes. E-bikes.
Surface	Asphalt
Width	1.5m located to the right of a roads white line
Vegetation clearance	Maintained to be clear of the route: not encroaching
Horizontal curves	As road dictates
Slope and drainage	As road dictates

Level of Maintenance	None to Low
Barriers	In places the cycling route may not be fully constructed as an “On-road cycling Route”. Cyclists may encounter sections where the road has been narrowed (ie: there is no white line with 1.5 m to the right of the line). The narrowed section should include signage that directs cyclists and vehicles to “Share the road”.
Comments	Wearing a safety approved bike helmet is required by law. Level of difficulty: moderate to difficult. Roads may have steep hills and heavy traffic. Road biking experience is recommended. Should be able to ride in a straight line, shoulder check and use hands to signal your intent to turn, slow down or stop. Likely not suitable for young and inexperienced cyclists.

Report:



On-road cycling routes are not separated from the road. The route is the 1.5m asphalt surface to the right of a road's white line. Their level of safety is not as high as for routes that are dedicated to bikes or separated from the road. An on-road cycling route may be easy to construct when building and resurfacing roads. It is recommended that bike logos be painted to the right of the white line to show that this 1.5m space is used by cyclists. The second white line may be seen when there is additional space for parking to the right of the cycling route.

**Future Working Group areas**

Jenna Drive; Shale Road; road access from Jenna Road to the Crown Land OR

Foothills to log existing sidewalks and multi use paths OR

Two right of ways located between 7566 and 7678 Lantzville Road

The Foothills was chosen from the above for a working group; Thursday evenings were agreed on; June 26 at 6 pm; meet at Harwood and Copley Ridge Road at the top of the road

July 8 will be the next one at Jenna Drive; Shale Road; road access from Jenna Road to the Crown Land and meet at Owen Road

MOVED AND SECONDED, THAT the meeting be extended past 8 pm

### **Beach Closure Update**

In relation to the beach low tide walk, the Committee discussed the closure of Sebastian and Harper Road Beach Ends due to water testing results from Island Health. The Committee questioned why the beaches were closed as the issue is in the water, not on the beach. Further, the Committee questioned whether the District has the authority to close the beaches because the beaches are not District property. Director Wells advised the Committee that the Director of Public Works made these decisions and that he could be contacted for further information.


### **Fog Zone**
